LETTER FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

THANK YOU FOR SUPPORTING Laura Baker Services Association's mission to respect the life choices and dreams of people with developmental disabilities and help them reach their goals. This is important work, and it is not easy. The



people we serve rely on dedicated staff to help them with daily living needs and activities. They rely on the broader Northfield community to acknowledge them and welcome them as part of the community. They rely on our legislators and government agencies to support them with services and sufficient funding so that they can live a full and fulfilled life. Isn't this what all of us want and need?

The Board of Trustees has several areas of focus beyond our governance responsibilities. They include:

- Advocate for individuals who work in this industry so that they receive equitable compensation.

These are some of the real challenges for the community of individuals that we serve. All of them are substantial and will require legislative support for progress to occur.

Unfortunately, funding and services have a political aspect and our clients have little to no voice in this arena. They rely on us to speak for them. Please be vocal in your support. I encourage all of you to read Sandi Gerdes' *In Community* blog to stay informed of the issues and how they affect us. We celebrated our mission last December with our annual Gala. You were incredibly generous, making this our most successful fundraising event ever. Many of you support a variety of causes, and I thank you for making Laura Baker Services such a large part of your philanthropy. I also thank the many who share their time and talents to help us provide broader and more impactful services to our clients. Last, and not the least by far, I thank the LBSA staff, especially those who provide direct care for our clients. PATHWAYS TO THE FUTURE

2017 IS SHAPING UP to be a year of traveling in the wilderness and cutting down the brush. Thank you for joining us on our journey. In a conversation with a community member recently, our work was characterized as dooropening. I long for the days when there are no doors to open.



You may wonder "What is the wilderness we're traveling in?"

A part of LBSA's strategic vision is to be on the cutting-edge of developmental disabilities. Some may look at our traditional service models and think, "Not so much." There may be an element of truth in that. We believe strongly in continuous quality improvement. That requires us to be unapologetically aware of our strengths and weaknesses and willing to make the changes that keep us strong and diminish our weaknesses.

We continue to invest in traditional models of support because we believe in a full range of supports for a full spectrum of needs. The evils of institutions are more about how people are treated and viewed than about the housing model. If we don't change the way we think and treat people, it doesn't matter where they live.

In our early 2017 Department of Human Services licensing review, licensors were impressed with how person-centered our service plans, policies and goals are. It's always good to hear the recognition. We've been operating as a person-centered agency for a long time. Person-centered thinking means that we need to include the person served in the conversation, and let them guide the decision-making. It means that we must let go of our own biases and values and listen. This is hard work. I frequently see well-meaning people making decisions based on their own



values without even talking to the person whose life will be impacted. That is NOT person-centered planning. THAT is business as usual, deciding on behalf of someone we see as not being capable of making the RIGHT decision.

So that's a piece of the wilderness – even the formerly

orderly progression of traditional services is a bit Wild West these days. And with no support from the legislature for rate increases for our staff, finding and retaining staff for existing programs, say nothing of developing new



programs, continues to be a daily struggle.

The larger wilderness has to do with figuring out new options. We're working to develop a housing model that is integrated, close to community services and supports to minimize transportation issues, and is affordable. We've got some

exciting possibilities, and we're creating the map as we go. We need innovators, investors, influencers and others to join us in this project. The experts who are working on it with us say it's both replicable and not been done in this way before. Wilderness.

In conjunction with that project we're thinking about new (or going back to older) ways of supporting people. Less formal support relationships. What does that mean? Let's talk about it.



We will continue to work with families to respond to needs and develop solutions for now and the future.



Our supporters and friends make all of this work possible. Your support inspires us. You provide your wisdom, your talents and your treasures to make the work both richer and more real.

THANK YOU – the pages of this report are filled with the evidence of the good you do. To the families and people we support who share their vulnerabilities in their stories, community partners who dream and do with us, donors who give to

move the work forward, volunteers who give their time and talents, staff members who do the work every single day – we couldn't do it without you.

It takes a village - thank you for your citizenship.

2016 Accomplishments

The work is exciting. The work is excruciating. The vision is gigantic and the tasks can be overwhelming.

Redesigning what we do for today and into the foreseeable future requires big, hairy, audacious goals, radical collaboration, patience, persistence and a healthy supply of rose-colored glasses.



That's what we did in 2016. We collaborated with new and unusual partners on projects where we consistently found ourselves saying, "We are creating the path as we go. We know what we want to do. We don't have a map for how to get it done." It's part of our commitment to be on the leading edge of service provision for people with developmental disabilities. We've gotten very comfortable with the phrase, "We don't know." and "We will see if we can figure



it out."

Some of our partners include: Three Links, Millstream Commons, Village on the Cannon, Northfield Promise, Governor's Council on Diversity and Inclusion – Civic Engagement Subcommittee, Northfield HRA Affordable Housing Task Force, Three Rivers Community Action, St. John's Lutheran Church, United Methodist

Church, Carleton College Center for Community and Civic Engagement, St. Olaf College Civic Engagement Center, St. Olaf College Department of Social Work and Family Studies, Neuger Communications Group, Mike Hero and many more.

We listened and continued to work in spite of dire warnings of not enough money, staff, housing or jobs to go around. (We used up a big supply of rose-colored glasses in the process.)

 Clients and staff worked together to ensure that we are keeping the promises we make: supporting clients to reach their dreams and goals.



- We transitioned our private school to a partnership with Cannon Valley Special Education Cooperative. We provide the space, they provide the program. In the process, we remodeled Millis Hall and Laura Baker Center to accommodate the new partnership and make space for our Creative Arts program and for our sensory rooms.
 - We increased our fundraising results by 18% and exceeded our goal by more than \$50,000.



- We ended the year with almost 1,000 people taking part in our advocacy efforts.
- We held another Reverse Job Fair, with over 30 employers and 20 people with disabilities making connections.
- We continued our public education and advocacy campaign, including

expanded social media, to ensure that ALL people with intellectual and developmental disabilities are included as a part of policy-making and funding conversations.

- We released a new video featuring parents telling their stories and challenges.
- We continued our work to define internal processes that have the potential to create efficiencies for us as a business. In that same work, we created a data warehouse where we will be able to aggregate data to advance the field of developmental disabilities and help us tell our stories.
- We hosted many interns who made many of our projects possible. Interns assisted with Music Therapy, Family Support Services, the Reverse Job Fair and housing projects, and provide program support for staff members.
- We continued to recruit and orient staff members to accomplish our mission in a variety of roles.
- We moved forward with our housing collaboration, gaining agreement among four groups with diverse interests and outcomes.



2017 Organizational Goals

e're continuing much of the work in 2017 – doing what it takes to accomplish big, hairy, audacious goals.

 Continue to provide robust and diverse learning opportunities for employees to understand our desired organizational culture and to become ambassadors of that culture.



- Create a leadership development curriculum to ensure that all staff members have the opportunity to develop leadership skills.
- In conjunction with research partners, create and conduct employee surveys to move our "employer of choice" goal forward.
- Collaborate with community partners to develop integrated, accessible, affordable housing for people with disabilities in Northfield through a specific project. Engage with interested community partners to continue to expand these opportunities.
- In conjunction with a family support group, continue to investigate opportunities for service change and expansion, including respite and transition services.
- Establish an annual advocacy platform and engage the community in advocating for people with disabilities.
 - Advocate for adequate reimbursement with our payers.
 - Participate in statewide civic engagement efforts to improve communication between government entities and the public.



- Examine our organizational structure and capacity and adapt as necessary to allow us to maintain and improve services to our current customers and transform those services to meet our vision of the future.
- Raise \$340,000 to support the activities and people of the organization, particularly our Creative Arts program and housing and advocacy initiatives.



Create a data

management structure and systems that allow us to meld information from a variety of sources to measure outcomes in support of our organizational mission, vision, values and goals.



- Develop competence in end-end process leaders and standardize the use of end-end processes, incorporating them into standard operating procedures.
- Integrate and successfully use data to share our stories and outcomes.



CLIENT PROFILE



LAMIYA

"People are important to LaMiya."

Staff spoke on behalf of LaMiya.

AMIYA has been a challenging client because of the level of care it took for her to feel safe. Before she arrived at Laura Baker Services in 2004, LaMiya was in a "crisis" home in the Twin Cities. She lived behind a locked door in a basement room that had a bed, a couch, a TV and three old stoves that no longer worked. She ate mainly rice. She only had aggressive behavior to communicate, and she had a lot of trust issues.

She has come a long way. Learning a few words in sign language and how to use a picture board were key to helping LaMiya communicate her needs and reduce her aggressive behavior. Now, when she gets aggressive she will sign that she is sorry. We can even ask her for a hug. She gives great hugs! Routines are important to LaMiya. When she gets home from her day program, even before she chooses a snack, she straightens the curtains and rugs and looks out the front door to see who else is coming home. Another part of her routine is to go through the sale ads in the newspaper. She recycles the ones she doesn't like. Target and Cub ads are her favorites.

LaMiya likes her crayons. She chooses a picture of a crayon and gives it to her staff. She peels the paper off and breaks them in half. Sometimes she uses them to color in her coloring book.

She loves to shop and even carries her own bags, which is something she couldn't do before. If she knows we are going shopping, she gets a big smile on her face and waves her hands. LaMiya is an independent woman who knows what she wants! She picked out her new Sketcher tennis shoes with her staff at the mall. When she first arrived at LBSA, she was afraid to take off her shoes and would go to bed with them on.

She also likes going to the movies and eating out. Going out into the community with LaMiya has not always been easy. Going out to eat was one of her goals. It took many years of smaller steps to achieve, starting with ordering in the drive-through. Now she can go to a sit-down restaurant because she is able to wait. She especially likes Perkins.

People are important to LaMiya. It takes a long time for her to warm up to people, though, because she needs to know she can trust you. When she likes you, she has a big smile on her face, which is worth coming to work for.
